After nearly a year of hard work our website has been completely rebuilt. It can be accessed at this link <u>https://www.8thafhsoregon.us/</u>. We contracted with a Vancouver web designer and friend of the organization, Garry Stasiuk, to accomplish the work <u>https://uofgts.com/</u>

Originally we thought we only needed to update much of the website information and eliminate errors, but we found that the website code was too obsolete to be functional with current web protocols or compatible with tablets and smart phones. We were denied editing access by the web host due to the unfortunate passing of staunch Chapter supporter and website designer Tom Philo. This required that we find a new web host, obtain a new domain name, and completely redesign and re-code the website from the ground up.

General Meeting Program August 26, 2023

On October 8th, 1952, the Korean War was in full swing and the U.S. was practicing for possible airstrikes on U.S. soil by Russian Tu-4 bombers. A B-29A enroute from Travis A.F.B. in California was sent to make a mock bombing attack on Portland, and it was to be intercepted by na F-94A Starfire. This would give the B-29 and F-94 crews practice in interception, defense, and mission tactics.

Between Tualatin and Wilsonville, the two aircraft collided. The F-94A made a safe landing at Aurora State Airport, but the B-29 crashed with the loss of the crew and the death of a P.G.E. lineman on the ground.

The incident was witnessed from the ground by many people, and the Tualatin Valley Fire Department was called out to the crash. Yvonne Addington, an historian for Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue, and her father was among the firemen who responded. She will make a presentation about this incident at our upcoming August meeting. We plan to have several other people from the area there, with pieces of the B-29 wreckage, personal effects and photos taken at the time. This will be a rare opportunity to find out about a local aviation tragedy and honor those who were lost.

B-17 warbirds fleet update

The recent F.A.A. Advisory on the B-17 wing attach fittings has finally been released. There are three B-17s which have shown compliance and will remain flying: they are "Sentimental Journey," "Yankee Lady," and "Ye Olde Pub". "Sally B" in the U.K. will also remain flying. There are several other B-17s to be inspected, including "Thunderbird" and "Aluminum Overcast", but these two are currently undergoing extensive repairs to return to flight readiness.

"Ye Olde Pub" was seen recently at the JBLM McChord Field Airshow and Warrior Expo. She flew twice on Saturday and Sunday, accompanied by a P-51 Mustang and the Me-09 who put on a great show Even though "Ye Olde Pub" is a Vega-built ship, it was great to see a B-17 flying by Boeing's private mountain again.

Additionally, the C.A.F. had a 10-plane contingent putting on their "Tora Tora Tora" reenactment.

The C.A.F. Arizona Wing will have their B-17 "Sentimental Journey" and B-25 " Maid in the Shade" in the northern Washington area. Check their website, and that of the Museum of Flight, for details <u>https://www.azcaf.org/tour/</u>.

Lockheed Constellation "Bataan"

In July of this year, the Texas Flying Legends C-121A Constellation "Bataan", landed at the Aurora State Airport, in Aurora, Oregon. It was the personal transport of General Douglas MacArthur. The aircraft was there for some interior work, after which it will appear at the E.A.A. AirVenture Aviation Event in Oskkosh, Wisconsin. It will return later to Aurora for the winter, to have AeroMetal Intl. install a complete interior. We will attempt to keep you posted about future flights.





It was a delight to see such a historic and beautiful aircraft flying again. A tradition was upheld when Oregon Chapter, 8th AFHS member Donald Keller helped wipe her down, although Jerry Ritter was unable to attend.

I had the opportunity to visit The Evergreen Air and Space Museum and the Tillamook Air Museum earlier this year. The Media, including Social Media, has been spewing Doom and Gloom regarding both Museums. They talk about bankruptcy and huge empty spaces. I do not know about their financial standings, but the large empty space stories are unfounded. Both Museums have expanded their displays greatly. Their facilities are clean, well lit, and filled with interesting aviation displays. Be sure to include visits to them in your future plans. Harold (last name redacted to protect the not-so-innocent!) was a crew chief in the 493rd Bomb Group, 8th Air Force stationed in Debach, England. He started out with the group's B-24 Liberators, and transitioned to B-17 Flying Fortresses when they were assigned those aircraft. (The B-24 which he had been in charge of, was taken over by the crew of Earl Wasson, the author of "The Parson's Chariot" in the 8th A.F. News.)

Harold had a good time "putting on" the other members of his Group. He befriended the Boeing factory representative, and would spend time getting to know him when he visited to the 493rd. They used to talk to the combat crews about their exploits.

One day Harold one day told the Boeing representative, "You know, you hold the honorary rank of Major in the Air Corps, and that gives you the same privileges and opportunities that the GIs enjoy. If you can convince a crew to let you go along on a milk run, and you get five missions to your credit, they will award you the Air Medal."

The Boeing Rep. had street smarts, but he trusted Harold. That was his mistake. Harold never thought the man would go through with it. He proudly confronted Harold after his fifth mission as a gunner, and Harold had to 'fess up about the deception.

I knew the Boeing representitive for many years, but I never knew why he had an extremely skeptical streak. Until I talked with Harold.






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
