# **General Meeting Program February 11, 2023**

Our May Speaker will be the return of Frank Heyl. Frank entered combat in the Pacific, shortly before the end of WW II. He was a B-25 pilot in the 5th Air Force, with approx. 400 hours flight time, in the B-25 Mitchell. He entered the Reserves after the war and flew Medevac missions between Japan and Korea. He flew C-46s and C-119s, with the Chinooks at Portland Air National Guard Base. While there, he flew or worked with many of the members of our 8th A.F.H.S., Oregon Chapter. After serving with the Air Force at the P.A.N.G. Base, he retired, and joined the Army National Guard. During his 40 yearlong military careers, he attended, taught, and developed Survival and Medevac Programs. He taught Medevac and Survival courses during the Vietnam war, and he served as the Air Ground Safety Consultant on the Alyeska Pipeline.

During the Vietnam War Frank became a helicopter pilot and was involved in pilot training. This month Frank will tell of his experiences at the Portland Air National Guard base, and his helicopter experiences as a pilot for the Chief Investigator for the F.B.I. in the D.B. Cooper investigation.

This will be a chance to learn about the investigation and search for D.B. Cooper from a first-hand source.

Our Chapter's association with the Beaverton Elks Lodge Number 1989 began in 1992, when Andy Brown and several others of our founding members began meeting in their family's homes. They were laying the foundations of our organization.

The first official meeting was held in the old Beaverton Elks Lodge in February 1993. This building is now a charter school, located across the parking lot from the current Lodge. Attendance would range from 125 to 175 people. We would fill the Main Hall, the Guests Bar, and the Card Room.

The Elks maintained a full kitchen and offered a meeting meal, which was always excellent. The Elks Staff were always accommodating and helpful.

Hats were not to be worn in the Lodge, out of respect for the Elks and veterans (not to mention proper etiquette!). The only requirement was that one of our members had to be an Elk. In the tradition of service to others that they observed that number was never in question. 4

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We have met in several rooms in the old Lodge and the new one, and the Elks have always made room for us for over 30 years. Over the years many of the rules have changed, mostly for the better. We have occasionally explored other venues due to construction or location, but none have extended the courtesy, quality, service, and affordability of the Elks.

## Briefings by Donald L. Keller

#### B-17 warbirds fleet not grounded

There are many rumors circulating speculating grounding of the U.S.-based air worthy B-17 warbirds. This has come about in response to the announcement that the Yankee Air Museum in Michigan has recently voluntarily grounded their B-17 "Yankee Lady."

The rumors concern an F.A.A. Airworthiness Directive (A.D.) regarding B-17 wing spars. The most recent A.D. about wing spars was issued in 2001. Many of the B-17 fleet have already complied with this A.D. or have been inspected, regarding this A.D. "Aluminum Overcast" and "Thunderbird" are currently undergoing maintenance to be in compliance. The other B-17s are being inspected or are undergoing repairs or restoration.

Yankee Air Museum is being proactive in their Safety and Maintenance program. There are concerns about the spars, but it is the wing attach spar points that are drawing scrutiny. Some aircraft have spotted corrosion or cracking in these areas.

There is no new A.D. concerning this, nor is there an order grounding the B-17s. Several owners are investigating repairs or replacements for safety's sake, in anticipation of a possible A.D. As always, safety is and should be the first priority. There are several B-17s undergoing restoration to flight airworthiness, so there are many minds working on this problem.

#### **Oregon International Air Show**

The Oregon International Air Show has announced that the Erickson Air Collection will have their AD4W Skyraider, F8F Bearcat, and the F4U-7 Corsair performing the "Deliverance" Revue. Planes of Fame will also be bringing their P-38J Lightning and F4U-1A Corsair.

The show will be at the Hillsboro Airport, on May 19th, 20th, and 21st. There will also be an air show in McMinnville later this summer. The Hillsboro show will also feature current fighter jet demonstrations.

#### Flying Heritage and Combat Armor Museum

The Flying Heritage and Combat Armor Museum in Everett, Washington will be re-opening on May 27th. It will be open on Saturdays and Sundays. On June 14th, the schedule will be extended to Wednesdays through Sundays.


