A "Tomboy" in the ATA

The USA had WASP unit while the British had the ATA which had both men and women in it. Both had to same mission - ferry planes around as needed so that other men could fly combat. Nancy Miller Livingston Stratford was one of those WWII ferry pilots in the ATA.

"The Spitfire was my favorite fighter; flying it was a real treat. As you open it up for takeoff, there's a surge of power. You're forced hack into the seat and must make a definite effort to retain balance. As you get used to this surge, you anticipate it, make the correction beforehand, and hardly notice it on the actual takeoff. The hand is fairly tensé on the throttle; the head is set ahead briefly to notice the direction of takeoff and any correction to be made. In a Spitfire, you look side to side, as you can't see ahead at all until the tail is up. The rush of air whips into the cockpit, blowing particles up and around. The right hand moves according to the feel of the plane - the tail coming up, the slight pressure back, and the feeling of becoming airborne." http://www.militaryaerospace.com/index/display/avi-wire-news-

Last Man Standing Laid to Rest

At the age of 110 Claude Choules died in a Perth Australian nursing home. He joined the Royal Navy at the age of 14 and served in both world wars. He was born in 1901 at Wyre Piddle in the county of Worcestershire, England.

Florence Green of Britain is the only known other living veteran of WWI - but she did not serve in combat.

VE Day Means a Lot to The Eastern Nations

According to official figures, the USSR lost 6.8 million soldiers "that were killed, died of wounds in captivity, from diseases, accidents, or court-martialed", and 4.4 million captured or missing in action. The lost civilian population was 14.4 million dead for a total of 26.6 million people killed (some estimates are at 28 million) of all people who were under Soviet control at the start of the war. An estimated total of 55 million people in total died as a result of the war.

61 nations participated in WW II; with combat operations in over 40 countries.

In Belarus alone one third of all Belarusians died. More than 200 cities were completely ruined.

The Great Patriotic War, the Eastern Front portion of World War II, lasted for 1418 days and nights.

1933 to 1937 William Dodd Ambassador to Germany

From a teaching long time teaching background in Chicago then appointed to be the Ambassador to Germany by Franklin Roosevelt (after a lot turned it down), this man soon learned what was being said in Germany was not just bluster – but truth and was being implemented.
