Vaughn Erickson – 398 BG (H)

S/Sgt Vaughn Erickson died on December 9, 2012. He was ball turret gunner, rather large to get into there at just over 6 feet, but he was able to scrunch in there with no problems throughout his 35 mission career in B-17s. He was a local member of the Oregon 8th Air Force Historical Society.

He was wounded on a mission over a target when he got out of the turret, the Luftwaffe would not go after bombers while their friendly flak was firing, and was promptly wounded. Afterwards he thought it was safer to say in the turret. He still had his piece of flak. He never reported it, since to do so would have grounded him on his next mission, his 25th, with his crew. And after 25 your also got to go on a 1 week leave usually.



He also photographed Ravenoville Plage, near Utah Beach, on D-day out of the bomb-bay from 8,000 feet after they had bombed a coastal battery there.

US WWI Centennial Commission to based out of Kansas City

World War I, "The Great War", "The War to End all Wars" started on July 28, 1914 as results of a Serbian killing Archduke Ferdinand while he visiting Sarajevo inside of Serbia June of 1914. This caused The Austrian-Hungarian Empire to declare War on Serbia, who was allied with Russia, and thus the entangling alliances of Europe all honored their treaties and World War I was started. Actual battles in Northern Europe did not start till August after all sides had mobilized. The USA did not join the war till April of 1917.

James Morehead - P40 Combat Ace

Col Morehead died in March of 2012. He joined the Army Air Corps in 1940 (renamed Army Air Force in 1941) and trained at Hamilton Field. A pilot crashed into him while he was awaiting to take off and put him into the hospital. The unit he was to be assigned

to was shipped to the Philippines before the war – and all were either killed or captured. He then was assigned to the South Pacific in 1942.

"On pure bravado, he did a slow roll and went after a Betty bomber," DeLisle said. "The bombers had guns around their nose and in the tail. Morehead came in at a perfect angle. The bomber's guns had no shot."

He then went on to be one of the first into Germany, then to Bastogne as part of Major General Maurice Rose division.

William H. Erick was a infantry replacement that landed on Omaha beach in August of 1944 on his way to the 30th Infantry, 119th Regiment, 1st Battalion, Headquarters Company, Communications Unit, Radio Section.

"In a hedgerow in France, one of our radio operators was walking behind the row and just the top of his antenna was showing. The Germans must have had their binoculars. An 88-millimeter gun of theirs let go. It hit the top of the antenna and radio and knocked the radio operator ass over tea cart, but he was never scratched. The shot tore the radio right off his back."

Bob Strong was supposed to be a ground crewman – but that did not always stop someone from flying combat in the South Pacific.

Their pilot, George Webster, also recalled when the engines went out. Strong used hoses to transfer the gasoline to the working engines. They landed with 18 gallons of gas. Webster, who is 97 and lives in Virginia, recalled Strong as efficient and conscientious.
