War Reporting of D-Day in WW II

Unlike todays reporting methods where you can do a live video feed from pretty much anywhere using a satellite phone, in WW II you wrote it, and sent it back on a plane if lucky or a ship to a central location, then it went through censors, then transmitted back to the states and then distributed via the wire services, which sent it to the newspapers which may or may not print it.

Organized as a way to attrition the French into a defeat (almost worked, there was a Mutiny later that was suppressed and most of the leaders shot by firing squad) the Germans wanted to kill as many French soldiers by forcing them to defend areas that were especially un-defendable.

2nd Polish Army Corps – From Soviet POWS Camps to Italian battles

Taken captive by the USSR when they invaded Poland in September of 1939 in conjunction with NAZI Germany, they were sent to camps then after 1941 to central Asia. In a schrew plot to get rid of them so that they would not help re-constitute Poland as it was before the war, they were then shipped to the Middle East where they were trained and equipped by the British before being used in the Italian Campaign. http://www.eurasianet.org/node/79056

From WAAC to WACs Over 8,000 Served Overseas

Like the WASP flyers that came after them, the WAAC was organized to free up men for combat while they filled in behind the lines in support roles. Over 150,000 were eventually added into the Army roles.

WW II Quick Facts

The total (military and civilian) in WW2 was easily 50 million killed (could be higher, China's real losses will never be known). USSR losses (estimated) at around 25 million. The losses of people killed are approximately: Britain 270,000 military and 60,000 civilians, Australia 17,501, Canada 42,000 USA 405,000, Holocaust 7 million, Germany 5 million military and 2 million civilians killed by Allied bombing. France, which had surrendered, had 567,600 dead (including around 17,000 Railroad workers), while Japan had 2 million military and one million civilian, including atom bomb, deaths. The below list is not really all inclusive since Mexico had an Aviation unit fighting in the Pacific and they do not include their combat losses.

The USA gave Russia 19 million tons of aid including 6430 planes, 3734 tanks, 5 million boots, plus uniforms (there is a WW II movie were a Russian is thanking an American for the fine uniform he is wearing) among other things. The British also shipped 5,800 planes and 4292 tanks (not all of which arrived due to being sunk). One Valentine tank captured by the Germans outside of Leningrad in 1942 had 40 kilometers total driving time on the tank when captured.

A US Battlefield's Surgeon Diary in WW II

Pre-cursor of a full "MASH" unit this independent unit moved whenever the front line moved. Sometimes it was right behind the main line within mortar distance, sometimes at the end of the artillery range. The Second Auxiliary Surgical Group with Doctor Paul Kennedy worked from North Africa to Germany. His son published a book based on his diary and photos called Battlefield Surgeon.

Just being a guard at a camp where people are killed, not directly involved but assigned there, now will get you life in prison if you live in Germany. He was tried under a new German novel crime model—just being part of anything where a crime occurred makes you as guilty as someone pulling a trigger or giving the order—even if you just folded clothes. Railroad workers, food suppliers, anyone connected to the scene even in-directly, makes them guilty since they supported the crime, now can be convicted.

VENUE


Meeting is being held at the Eastmoreland Golf Course Restaurant 2425 SE Bybee Blvd

Only going south can you exit. Going south the exit just says Eastmoreland or Westmorland and the exits are RIGHT AT THE OVERPASS. Take the exit south of the overpass – 10 feet past it – and turn right.

The MAX station platform is what you will in the middle right over the RR lines but that is the road.

If going north take the Tenino St exit, turn left, go ¼ mile till SE Milwaukie Ave (SE 17^{th) and} turn right (North) till you get to Bybee then turn right onto it. Once you cross over 99E turn left into the parking lot.
