The Russian Steamroller – Myth or Fact?

What is mostly known about the East Front in WW II is that the Germans always stated that there was an endless supply of Russians to replace their losses and they were almost always outnumbered. In sheer numbers that does not seem to be the case, but the German system was different in the number of men on the front line vs the whole number of people in the campaign. This article does not differentiate that. US forces usually had a 7:1 ratio of support troops vs combat troops, British 6:1, as did the Germans. I have never read of seen the ratio of Russian, but from inference it was around 3:1 – they had a higher ratio of people in the front line compared to the other nations per unit size.

The French forces and the one British division on the right flank actually did very well – but were forced to halt their attack due to the center and left flank failure to advance. A "Buffalo Soldier", George Edwards, Dies at 96

He was part of the all Black 92nd Infantry Division that fought from North Africa to the Italian Alps. It was thought that it was more acceptable to have them in the "backwater" area than in the UK before Normandy. Blacks served as service troops in the UK and in northern Europe during WW II.

VENUE


Meeting is being held at the Eastmoreland Golf Course Restaurant 2425 SE Bybee Blvd
