# B-17 Top Turret Gunner / Engineer Louis Stoffer

He flew a full 35 missions aboard a B-17 between 1943 and 1945. He lives in Centralia, Washington.

He survived a crash landing into an oak forest with just a dislocated shoulder – but the plane blew up after he got out and could be heard for miles around England when it did.

He took lots of photos by knowing a clever base photographer who was re-utilizing excess film from gun cameras that would otherwise be thrown away and selling the film to crews.

Surrendered at the end of WW II, they were sunk by the US in order to avoid having to give them over to the Russians and other Allies. Items CAPTURED could be kept, items surrendered had to be shared – and the US did not want to share the technology of the submarines.

### MOH Sgt Wilburn Ross Dead at 94

As part of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division from North Africa to France he was awarded the Medal of Honor for manning, by himself, a light machinegun for over two days fighting off repeated counter-attacks by German Infantry.

"On Oct. 30, 1944, Sgt. Ross's company took heavy casualties from German forces, losing 55 of its 88 men. About 11:30 a.m., Sgt. #### A summary of the Raid to Berlin: February 3, 1945

A long summary of what one of the largest air missions of the 8<sup>th</sup> Air Force was like in 1945.

"Doolittle felt he was being ordered to change U.S. strategy and betray American principle. The Eighth Air Force commander got on the phone with his boss, General Carl "Tooey" Spaatz, commander of Strategic Air Forces in Europe (and an immediate deputy of General Dwight D. Eisenhower). No transcript of the conversation exists, and Doolittle did not mention the conversation in an autobiography published decades later."

### Building the Type-95 Model 1 Japanese WW II Trainer from Scratch

Unlike most Axis aircraft of WW II there are no engineering drawings of Japan's WW II trainer aircraft. After Japan agreed to surrender, but before it actually did, the whole government and military spent two weeks destroying most every document created during the war – including design plans of most everything. Plus after the war we destroyed most every aircraft discovered – unless it was interesting. # The Soviet Era "Shock" armies are back – but are more like the Honorific "Guards" Designation

The Bolsheviks military philosophy was that of attack was the best way to win. In that vein in the 1930s they always practiced offensive operations and one part of the offensive was a specially re-enforced army, a Shock Army, to break through lines to then exploit the rear – the Blitzkrieg tactic. But due to purges and Soviet top-down command style no army ever had the low level leadership or flexibility of command, and training, to actually do it till late 1944.

Their offensive only minded training is of the many reasons why in 1941 they lost so often. The Red Army was never trained in defensive operations – only attack operations, even when in defensive positions.

### Locating WW II Wrecks in the waters around of Papua New Guinea

For over two years heavy air warfare occurred in the South Pacific until New Guinea and Bougainville was taken in late 1943 / early 1944. Till then thousands of US and Japanese, plus Australian, and British Aircraft, went down in the waters around harbors and airfields. Allied records are pretty reliable as to where they went down, few if any records of Japanese aircraft locations exist since they were purposely destroyed after the way to avoid having a record of what they were really losing in the war.

#### Lucky 666 – The Only WW II Crew that earned two MOH and the other 7 crewmembers were awarded the Distinguished Service Cross on a Single Mission

With their salvaged B-17E 41-2666, that had a name of "Lucy" (which they painted over), which also happened to have a specialized installation of 3 photographic cameras that allowed it to see underwater reefs, it went alone on a photo recon
