5 1/2 Years as a POW in The Hanoi Hilton

Retired Lt. Col. Richard Smith was shot down in October of 1967 right outside of Hanoi during a mission. Enduring real torture, beatings, solitary confinement for weeks on

end, and starvation rations, he was re-patriated in March of 1973 when the US formally pulled out of Vietnam and conceded defeat.

No North Vietnamese person was ever held accountable for the beatings or torture that US servicemen endured, or those that died due to the beatings. Unlike European WWII atrocities, SE Asian, and often African ones, all get a pass on prosecution.

Claiming Credit – 72 Years Later – Still Controversial

Applying modern jargon and spin on events in the past occurs all over the world. Frank Louis Masoni was an assistant cook in the Marines, and in the Marines your main job is always infantry. During the Battle on Betio Island his cook status was not important, being a rifleman was and he was killed in combat on Day 2. Due to lack of experience in combat situations the stateside standards were impossible to adhere too due to the confusion on the island battlefield; his remains were never formally identified till this year.

Looking for Info on B-24 Crew Member Don Elliott

His B-24 was shot down in August of 1944 over Koror in the Palau archipelago. On August 28, 1944 the B-24 Liberator commanded by Capt. Closing the Story: B-17 Pilot Harry Chandler - March 15, 1945

The Official Ukraine name of the conflict is now World War II

The USSR, and the Russian Federation called it the Great Patriotic War to get people to feel that the war was fought from 1941 to 1945 as a common good of the USSR's controlled nations. With the breakup of the USSR, and Ukraine being one of the main locations battles were fought, and with the history of how the USSR chose to subjugate the people of the Ukraine especially under Stalin, they have now officially changed how books and people should refer to it as World War II like almost every other nation has since 1945.

The movie of King Tigers on parade in 1944 just before the Battle of The Bulge shows the size of them – but with only 452 built, and penny-packeted out from June of 1944 onwards, their psychological impact outweighed their battlefield impact.
