February 25, 2019

<u>The Federal Aviation Administration</u> (FAA) posted a rule in the <u>Federal Register</u> requiring small drone owners to display the FAA-issued registration number on an outside surface of the aircraft. Owners and operators may no longer place or write registration numbers in an interior compartment. The rule is effective on February 25. The markings must be in place for any flight after that date.

<Editor's note: I would put it on the blades of the drone or along the top spine.)

How the Red Arrow Came to Be for the 32nd Division

The National Guard was created as a result of the Spanish American War. When the 1898 war started the US Government found out that there were not regular army troops around to use as cadres to create the size of Army needed even to fight in Cuba. Therefore, they created them so that people would be trained, but not in the regular active Army, and then people with knowledge of weapons could be used to create a larger Army.

"Jerebek and 15,000 other Wisconsin National Guardsmen joined 8,000 from the Michigan National Guard in September 1917 at Camp MacArthur, Texas. There, these

men trained together as the 32nd Division — which was constituted on July 18, 1917 as one of sixteen National Guard divisions that more than doubled the size of the Regular Army. These 17 divisions formed the backbone of the American Expeditionary Force as it entered combat in the spring of 1918."

The Raid on Rommel – It Failed But it Inspired a few Movies About it

Killing enemy commanders was not written down as a rule of war – the idea to do so did occur and the most famous and successful was the shoot down and killing of Admiral Yamamoto by the US in 1943. Before that though the British tried to kill / capture General Erwin Rommel in 1941. It failed and Col Keyes was killed during the fighting. Gen. Rommel defied Nazi dictator Adolf Hitler's newly issued directive ordering the immediate execution of captured Commandos and arranged for Colonel Keyes to be buried with full honors. The German general's chaplain conducted the ceremony as Keyes was laid to rest beside four Afrika Korps soldiers killed in the raid. Rommel gave a funeral oration and, in an unprecedented soldierly gesture, pinned his own Iron Cross on the Briton's body.

Life in Ireland After WW I

Fighting in the British Army then returning to Ireland was a new peril for ex-soldiers that could also get you killed. When Ireland started it Ireland, and the IRA, started its campaign to have Ireland an independent nation and leave the UK.

Indeed, what is remarkable is the extent to which Britain complied with its "imperial obligation" to its Irish veterans. In the late 1930s, Britain was paying the equivalent of more than €100 million a year in disability pensions to Irish veterans. Industrial Grade Censorship via The Boer War

Public opinion in the modern era really started with the Crimea War due to the telegraph. But when the British went to fight in the Boer War in 1899 they had not changed their style of communication and it hurt them worldwide public opinion. This was not to be once WW I – The Great War – started in July of 1914.

"The press censors of the Second World War realized the folly of the First. Wilfrid Eggleston, the chief English press censor and later, the founder of Carleton University's journalism school, believed bad news stimulated people to fight. Canada had been protected from the grim reality of the First World War, and France's brutal censorship before June of 1940 had allowed the French people to ignore the Nazi danger until it was too late."

1 in 10 Died

Out of all the British soldiers who served in WW I about 1 in 10 died – around 600,000. In a family of 10 brothers who went to war – 1 died. Private John Calpin sent a Red Cross postcard to his wife to let her know he had landed safely in England, but died in November 1916 at the age of 39.
