#### Flying in the 386th BG

The B-26 Martin "Marauder" was a very fast medium bomber that flew from the deck to 18,000 feet. Most of the time they flew around 12,000 and unescorted – and at the best altitude for German medium and heavy flak effectiveness. One such flak scored a direct hit on a 386<sup>th</sup> BG 553 Bomb Squadron B-26 bomber on November 5, 1943 flown by Capt. Ray D. Williamson.

"I wanted the Marines. I was scrappy, 135 pounds, so the Marines sounded okay. I guess they didn't like my attitude. I was told, 'Then we will put you in the Army and send you to hell.' That's exactly what they said."

A 14th Armored Division tank with sandbags all around as extra "armor."



Was I hit? Which time? Yeah, we got hit. The first time I was the only one that got out alive. The whole turret was blown off and I went out through an escape hatch.

The British nick-name for the Sherman was "Bronson" – since the tanks used gas engine and when hit they "brewed up" like a Bronson burner.

# Merrill's Marauders – The Jungle version of The Long Range Desert Group

In 1943 there was not much the Allies could do in the CBI on the ground – hence this unit was formed to attack the Japanese behind the "official" front line. Led by Gen. #### Book on an Irish General in Britain's Service

Before Ireland broke away from the UK, many Irish joined the British Military. Some made it to high rank like General Edward Bulfin.

Bulfin saw active service in the Boer War, went to France with the BEF in 1914 in command of a brigade, doing well in several actions, most notably the defense of Ypres. In 1915 he commanded a very green division with some success, again at Ypres. He was then assigned to raise and train the new 60th Infantry Division, which he commanded at the Somme in 1916, and then took it into action at Salonika briefly, and then in Palestine.

# A short Concise Summary of the Battle of the Coral Sea

The first carrier vs carrier battle in history was a Japanese tactical / paper victory. However the resulting battle damage to the Shokaku and Zuikaku left them in repair yards forced changes in Japanese battle plans, which meant they were not at Midway. Faulty appraisal of combat damage during battle to America's carriers at Coral Sea – thinking they hit two different carriers and put each out of action when they only hit the same carrier twice then hit the Yorktown, and the USA's ability to repair ships must faster than the Japanese, meant the Yorktown was at Midway with its 80 plus aircraft, which made the Midway victory possible.

# The Ki-43 "Oscar" The Japanese Army's "Zero"

Officially the Hayabusa -Peregrine Falcon – was the land Army's main fighter. Like all aircraft which were designed pre-war the idea was a WW I style aircraft whose pilot used skill and the plane's agility to shoot down the enemy aircraft – which left it highly vulnerable to enemy fighter due to light weight construction and woefully under gunned.

An IG audit of military cemeteries showed that not all paperwork is done correctly – or correctly. "After inspecting some 4,141 graves at 16 military cemeteries, there were 108 errors found, including missing headstones, incorrect birth and death dates, and improper placement of grave markers."

Some of the errors go back to the Spanish American war! The report's conclusion was to have better training and more standardization of processes at all sites.

# GIB – Guys in Back – Supply and Support

WW II was a segregation war – whites were in the front line fighting and all non-whites were assigned as support troops and in the rear – but still died at times. Some of the most dangerous jobs, and most disliked – were given to blacks. This included ammunition ship loading and unloading and cleaning up the battlefields – which mean picking up the dead of both sides.

Of the 16 million who were sworn into active service only 3%, 496,777, are still alive.

"Author Andrew Brozyna says the norm overseas was three or four people behind the lines for every soldier up front." [Editor's note actually the real ratio is: US ratio was 7:1, British 6:1, Germans 6:1, Russian 4:1, Japanese around 3 to 1. A US Rifle division was around 16,000 – 3,600 in infantry regiments who did the fighting, 1,200 in artillery – rest support troops.]

# MIA from the 14th Air Force ID'd

2nd Lt. Toney W. Gochnauer, 24, of Amarillo, killed during World War II on Jan. 25, 1944, was accounted for on May 13, 2019. As Co-Pilot of a B-24 on a supply run from Kumming China to India it went missing in bad weather. Locals in the area reported debris and a wing in 2017 which was passed onto the US who sent a team to investigate and recovered remains.
